#### **Opium and U.S. Silver Coins**

The Trade Dollar was created to compete with the money from Mexico for trade with the Orient, mainly China. The Trade Dollar has 7.5 more grains of silver than the Seated Liberty Dollar. Exports from the U.S. to China included cotton, ginseng root, furs, mineral oil, sandalwood and massive amounts of silver specie. Specie is money from melted silver coins. Since all our silver coins were shy of silver weight until the Trade dollar, it became specie.

In 1875 a San Francisco newspaper reported that the silver specie that was sent to China was used to purchase opium from India. The Calcutta Mint in Kolkata, West Bengal, India would exchange the silver for Rupees. The opium trade between China and India exceeded the trade for all other goods at the time.

Great Britain eager to expand their empire also acquired vast amounts of silver specie from the United States. Between 1867-1875, 94.7 million British Pounds, mainly in silver was sent to India in exchange for opium. The Chinese needed the silver from the British and the U.S. because India wouldn't accept anything else in trade. The Trade Dollar was also linked with opium purchases. An article published in the Oct. 1874 issue of the American Journal of Numismatics reported 233,000 Trade Dollars were Received at the Calcutta Mint in a 3 month period.

Great Britain fed up with paying for Chinese imports like tea, silk and Chinaware (porcelain) using their valuable silver, flooded China with opium creating millions of drug addicts. Chinese laws prohibited Using silver to buy opium but couldn't be stopped due to the extensive opium smuggling operations. The opium trade reached it's peak during the 1870's. The U.S. minted 10's of millions of Trade dollars which was a better value by 3/4 grain of silver vs. the Mexican Eagle Dollar. Much of that flooded the Orient because the silver value was more than the face value of the coin. Chop marks can be seen on Trade dollars that have visited the Orient at one time or another. Chop marks can also be seen on our earliest coinage.

An example of a 1799 Draped Bust Dollar with chop marks is known to exist.

Between 1870 and 1890 there was a demonetization of silver with nations switching to a gold standard. Silver stock pile rose a 170%. Silver was sold at a discount.


So here I go again...on my soapbox:


