





COIN CRAZY

The Half Cent

Most non-collectors that you talk to never realized that the United States minted half cents from 1793 to 1857. The half cents were widely used amongst the poorer classes. The idea for the half cent dates back to 1784 where Thomas Jefferson, a congressman in the Confederation government, presented the idea after a thorough review of our monetary affairs. After replacing Benjamin Franklin as ambassador to France information was provided by the French to help us draft a new monetary system. The half cent was created using copper by order of Congress. The coin is to read 1/200 (200 equals one dollar). Progress was slow and little was done.

Matters began to change with a new government. In April, 1789. Alexander Hamilton, Treasury Secretary considered borrowing from European banks for the new government to function. Congress turned toward the monetary system instead. In the spring of 1790 congress asked for a comprehensive report for a mint and coinage from Hamilton. January 1791 the report was completed. Once again Congress did little.

Using the suggestions from Jefferson's report, George Washington wanted to move forward without formal law. Washington approached Congress again in the fall of 1791. A formal coin bill was drafted and signed into law on April, 1792. Washington appointed famous scientist David Rittenhouse as Mint Director and Henry Voight as Chief Coiner. The money was mainly used for the mint building and the necessary machines. Only half Dime's were minted in 1792.

In February 1793 the first copper coin was minted "Chain Cent". In may 1793 Voight oversaw the planchet preparation for the half cent. Minting started on July 18, 1793 where 31,934 pieces were produced. The obverse of the half cent was modeled after the Libertas Americana designed by Benjamin Franklin.

The mint closed in September for about a month due to a Yellow Feaver epidemic. Mint reopened but no more copper coins were produced until 1794. Miss Liberty, bust facing right was due to a redesign by Robert Scot. The designer of the 1793 bust facing left is unknown. Due to the rising costs of copper the weight of the half cent was reduced from 104 grains to 84 grains. A shortage of copper resulted in melting down Talbot, Allum and Lee tokens for the half cent planchets.




CHRISTMAS BANQUET






